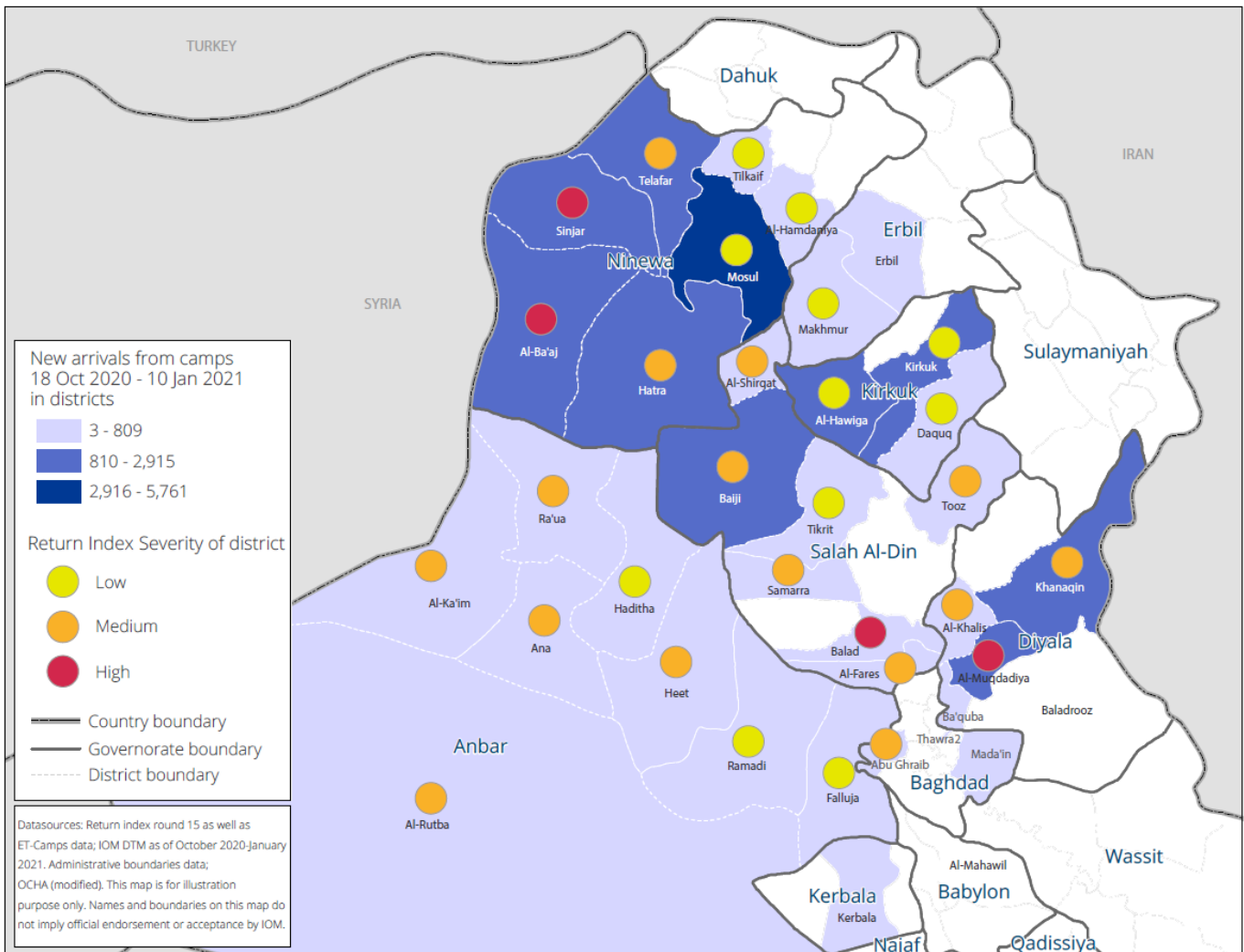

Between 4 and 10 January 2021, no new households have been recorded as arriving to non-camp settings following the closure or planned closure of camps that have taken place. A total of 5,450 households (27,890 individuals) have been recorded as arriving to non-camp settings since camp closures began in mid-October.<sup>4</sup> These households have arrived to the governorates of Anbar, Baghdad, Diyala, Erbil, Kerbala, Kirkuk, Ninewa, and Salah Al-Din. Of the total recorded arrivals since 18 October 2020, 1,631 households (30%) have not returned to their location of origin and are now considered to be secondarily displaced, while 3,819 households (70%) have returned to their respective village or neighborhood of origin and are considered to be returnees.

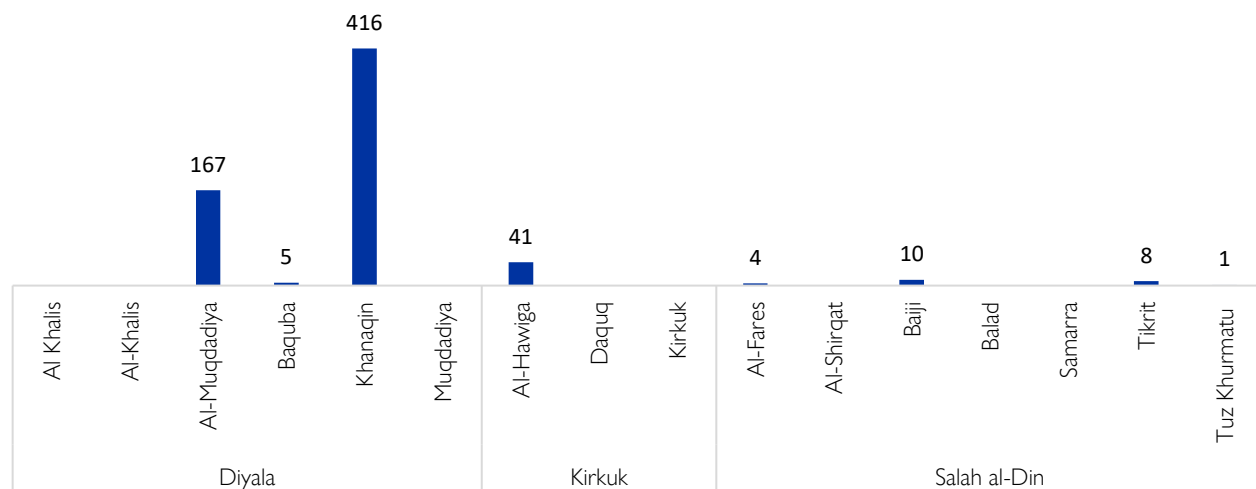
During the reporting period, a large number of households have been recorded as making additional onward movements since their initial departure from camps. In total, 652 households (3,255 individuals) have been recorded as making these additional secondary movements on to other non-camp locations since leaving their respective camps. These movements mainly occurred in Khanaqin and Al-Muqdadia districts in Diyala governorate. The main cause of these movements is reportedly due to households obtaining security clearance allowing onward travel. The chart on the next page shows the number of households who have undertaken secondary movements between non-camp locations, by districts of arrival.



- 1 Unless specified otherwise, camp settings include both formal camps and big informal sites.
- 2 In most cases, data on the number of individuals departing camps and arriving to new locations was collected. Where this could not be collected, the number was estimated based on an average household size of 6.
- 3 The DTM considers as internally displaced persons (IDPs) all Iraqis who were forced to flee from 1 January 2014 onwards and are still displaced within national borders at the moment of the assessment. Individuals having returned to their district of origin, but not location of origin (village or neighborhood), are still considered IDPs. Individuals who have been able to remain in location of displacement and are seeking to integrate are still considered IDPs. The DTM considers as returnees all those displaced since January 2014 who have returned to their location of origin (village or neighborhood), irrespective of whether they have returned to their former residence or to another shelter type. The definition of returnees is not related to the criteria of returning in safety and dignity, nor with a defined durable solutions strategy.
- 4 Some households have been retroactively added to the data set collection upon confirmation of arrivals from camps

These secondary movements have been recorded taking place within the same district of arrival, as well as onward to other districts. The majority of these movements were recorded in Khanaqin district, Diyala with 416 households (2,033 individuals) recorded as moving, Al-Muqdadia district, Diyala with 167 households (889 individuals), followed by Al-Hawiga district, Kirkuk with 41 households (200 individuals) recorded. Most of the households undertaking secondary movements originally departed from Al-Wand 1 and 2 camps (85%) in Diyala followed by Laylan camp in Kirkuk (7%) and Muskar Saad camp in Diyala (6%). Of the total, 177 households (27%) have not returned to their location of habitual residence and could still engage in further movements while 475 households (73%) have returned to their neighborhood of habitual residence. It is important to keep in mind that these additional secondary displacements are difficult to track, and could be more common than currently reported.

Departures (18 Oct 20 – 10 Jan 21)



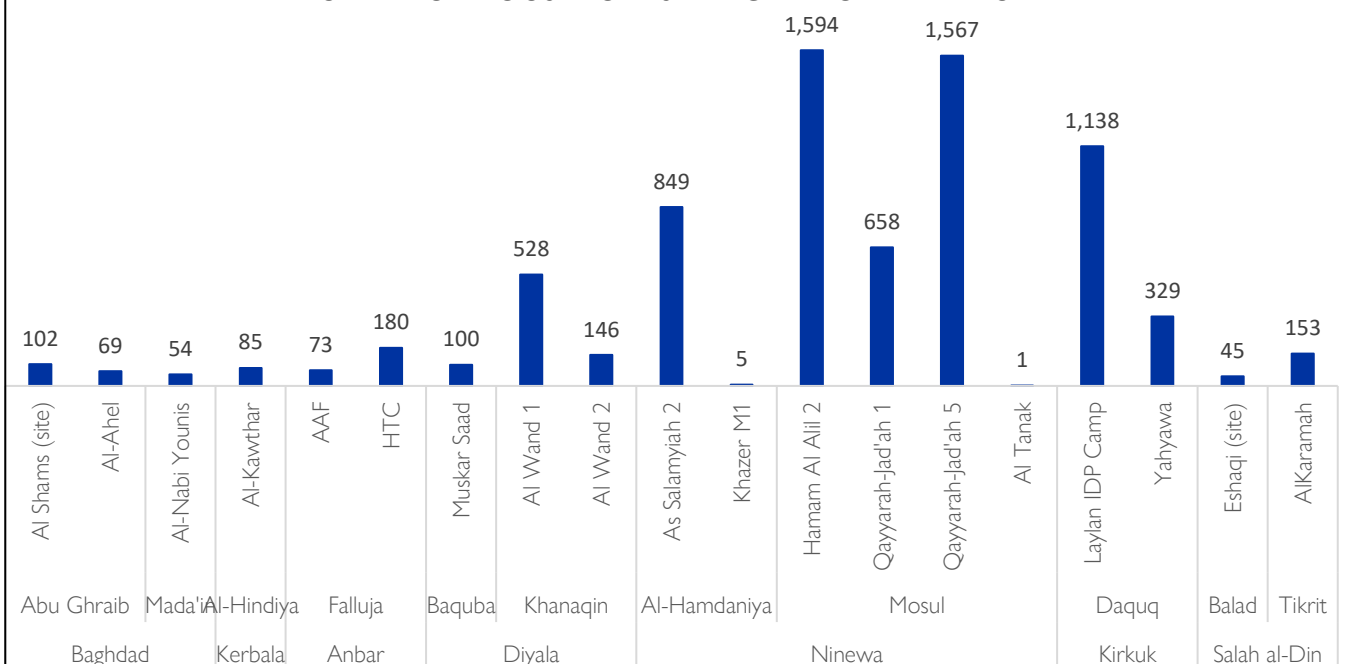

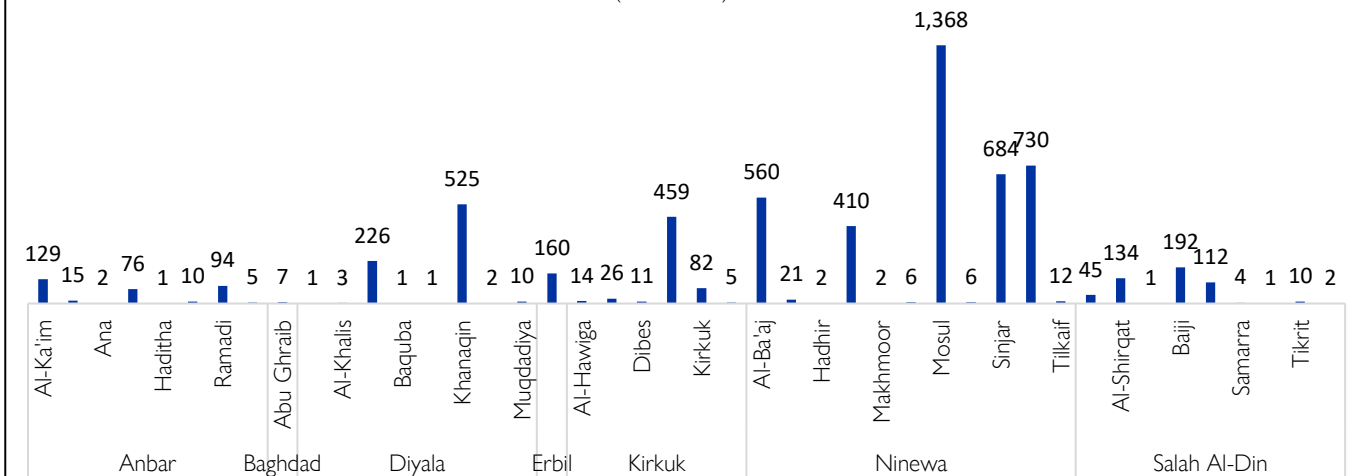
**19%** of all camp IDPs have departed a formal camp<sup>5</sup>

In the same reporting period, a further 662 households (3,201 individuals) were recorded as departing from camp settings, all from As-Salamyiah 2 camp in Al-Hamdaniya district, Ninewa, following the closure of the camp. At the time of reporting, not all departures from As Salamyiah 2 camp have been tracked as movement is still fluid. This brings the total number of departures to 7,676 households (38,152 individuals) that have departed from camps since this round of camp closures began in mid-October 2020. While most departures have taken place from Ninewa governorate, departures have also been recorded from camp settings in Kirkuk, Diyala, Anbar, Baghdad, Salah Al-Din and Kerbala governorates. Following the CCCM exit survey from households departing As Salamyiah 2 camp, 926 households (77%) out of 1,209 households indicated intentions to return to their exact neighborhood of origin. Most of these households intend to return to Markaz Al-Ba'aj subdistrict in Al-Ba'aj district, Ninewa.<sup>6</sup>
